PROGAMME—Hope Bell



Hope Bell is a crafter/artist who has been quilting for more than 20 years. A member of several quilt guilds, she recently became the Canadian Quilters Association representative for Eastern Ontario.

Hope started as a traditional quilter, but is an avid learner, so her quilts have evolved over time, and she has become known for her art and "Quiltangle" style quilts. In the last 5 years, she started doing more free motion work and developed her quilted zentangle style, drawing inspiration from nature, fabrics and zentangle art. After showing her Quilt Tangle pieces in guild Show and Tells

and quilt shows, she received numerous requests to teach workshops on her quilting style ... and subsequently created a workshop on this.

Since retiring in early 2023, Hope has been doing trunk shows and teaching quiltangle workshops, while continuing to experiment with quilting and fibre art.

COMMUNITY PROJECTS - Lynn Bradley and Maria Fleming

SPOTLIGHT ON: Carty House

Carty House is a welcoming community where refugee women have access to a safe and supportive first home in Canada. It is the only house in Ottawa specifically for refugee women. It was established in 2001 and became a non-religious Canadian non-profit organization in 2009.

As well as a place to live for up to 18 months, they offer a range of services to enable them to adjust to Canada and pursue work or careers. The House has 10 beds, 4 singles and 6 larger. This is often where our larger quilts go. The quilts go with them as they transition to housing of their own.

As a reminder, quilts of the following sizes are appreciated:

Cuddle quilts – 22" square

Kids quilts - from crib to twin - 40" x 40" to 60" x 72" (older teens may be tall)

Adult quilts - from twin (60" x 72") to queen

Wheelchair quilts - 36" x 36" to 36" x 40"

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ACQUILT GO! - Super Speedy Tool!

For those who missed the Accuquilt Go! Fabric cutter demonstrations at the January retreats, Shirley MacFadden will be back for a return engagement at the March 9, 2024, Sew Day at the Notre Dame Des Champs Community Center.

The Guild's cutter and dies are available to the members during all In-Person Sew Days and Retreats. Members are free to drop by and cut their fabric during this time and are not obliged to pay for the Sew Day or Retreat if they don't intend to stay.

This year, we are asking you to make a quilted item using a pattern from a book, magazine or template that you've signed out of our guild library. The size is up to you and adaptations are allowed. Only want to make one block from a bed quilt pattern? No problem. Table runners, bags, and other functional items are fine too, even a postcard. And of course, if you want to faithfully recreate a pattern exactly according to the pattern, ever better.

There will be four cash prizes totalling \$300 up for grabs. All you have to do is bring your completed project to the April meeting, where we will display your quilts for everyone to admire. During the meeting, we'll randomly draw four winners. So get cutting, finish your piecing and start quilting. The challenge is on!

BREAKING NEWS—CTQG IS ON INSTAGRAM!!!

If you are on Instagram, please log into your account and give us a follow: @commonthreadquiltguild. From there, please help us grow and reach audiences by engaging with us whenever you see a post, reel, or story of ours by liking, commenting, and sharing what we put up. The more activity on our posts, the higher Instagram will push them and allow them to be visible to others. If you are new to Instagram...

How Instagram algorithm ranks engagement:



Like (the heart icon) - Shows the audience is interested but the level of commitment is very low because all the user has to do is touch one button. The heart turns red if you have liked a post. Instagram will push the post a little.

Comment (the bubble icon) - The audience cares enough to leave a comment which takes time and shows more commitment. Instagram gives the post even more visibility than if it is liked alone.

Share (the paper airplane icon) - This is the highest level of engagement the audience can give. The user finds it relevant enough to share on their own page so Instagram recognizes the value to the audience and will push the post to even more users.

We will be working very hard to promote the 2024 Quilt Show to as many eyes as possible, so if you have an account, please follow and help us out!

If you are working on a quilt in progress to enter into the show, if you have a Mini "NO TOUCH" quilt ready (yes, remember we still need those too), and you feel like sharing that publicly, please feel free to send it via Instagram messages directly to @commonthreadquiltguild. Special Editorial—Slash Your Stash—Part Four

We're in the home stretch now, culling our curated fabric collection to either make room for more or simply to downsize our stash. While these ideas are not meant to discourage you from quilting, donating excess fabric or even selling it, I've presented some ideas on how to use your excess yardage that will brighten your home, show off your quilting cottons and reduce your stash. Let me know if you tried any of these projects or if you have any of your own ideas on using up our quilting fabrics.

18. Shower Curtain. I regularly change out my shower curtain and continue to be amazed at how different the bathroom looks with such a simple swap. You will need to sew long bands of fabric together lengthwise to get the right size but simple button holes (or grommets) along the top and a hem are all you need (plus a liner) for a quick change.

19. Decorative Art. You probably bought this fabric because you liked so why hide it on your shelf? Try hanging it as a decorator accent instead. Using canvas stretcher bars, staple the fabric to the frame and hang it up. Alternatively, you can re-use an older piece of art or even pick something up second-hand and stretch the cotton over the front of the old piece, stapling to the back. Another option is to cover large pieces of foamboard with your cotton. You can either hang them as is or attach a small photo to the fabric-covered board, essentially making a large mat for a smaller picture. These decorator pieces are most effective when grouped in pairs or in threes.

20. Bunting. I'm not talking a small garland made of individual accents here, but rather Americana-style gathered bunting. For this look, you'll need lengths of fabric. If you don't have several metres of one fabric, you can always piece together lengths in a coordinating colour scheme. Measure the length of your item to be decorated such as a table or railing. At regular intervals, gather the fabric widthwise and secure with twine. Once you have the desired length, add bows and or other accents to the gathers. Attach the swagged bunting and enjoy.

21. Garment Bags. As Canadians, we know the change of the seasons means packing away half of our wardrobe to make way for a different set of clothes. Using our quilt stash to cover up our winter coats, summer dresses or suits can protect them from dust, light and extend their life. The easiest way to make a protective garment bag is to simply sew two lengths of cotton together on three sides, leaving a small opening for the coat hanger hook. Hem the open bottom end and slip the cover over your piece of clothing. You may want to make the front of the garment bag out of two pieces of fabric, with an opening down the middle that can be fastened with a zipper, buttons, hook and loop tape or ties. As a bonus, this front piece can be made from different fabrics, using up your stash.

Lynn Bradley (In Person Sew Days) &

The next Sew Day is coming up - Saturday, March 9, 2024 from 9:00 until 5:00, and it will be In-Person!

The March Sew day will include a demonstration of the Accuquilt Go! Fabric cutter given by Shirley MacFadden. Shirley is one of the Guild's expert and frequent users of this time-saving tool. She will demonstrate how to use the cutter, tell us about a few tips and tricks and will debut a new Accuquilt die: a 'Block on Board (BOB)' die that produces an 8 inch (finished) Maple Leaf block. Shown below with a couple of quilts made with this die.

All are welcome to see the demo and to bring fabric to cut, without charge, even if you aren't staying for the Sew Day. The demo will be at 10:00 am. No need to sign up for in person Sew Days; just show up at the Notre Dame des Champs Community Center on Navan Road with cash in hand - \$10 for members and \$12 for non-members (exact change would be appreciated).

As usual, in person Sew Days are no-frills. Participants help with set up and bring their own lunch and snacks. Coffee and tea will be available.

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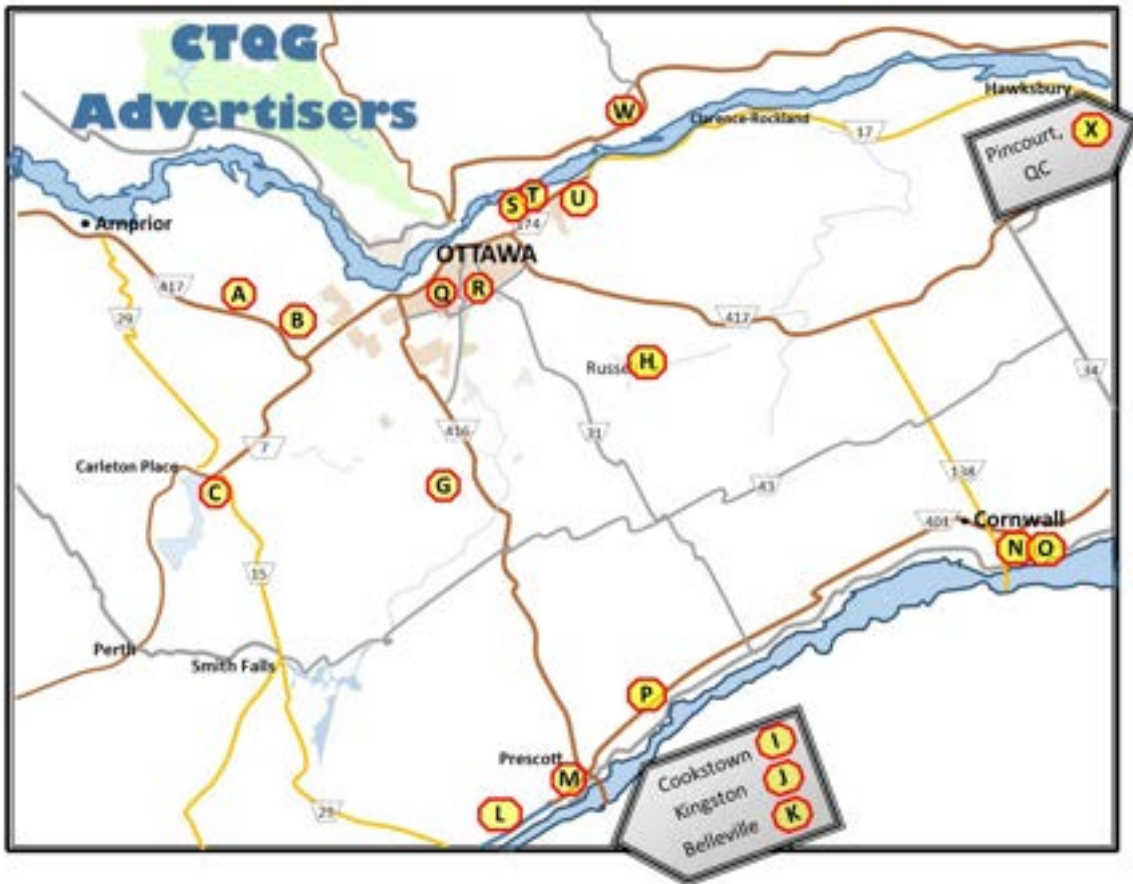
